Document Camera

QR Codes

Are you wondering what that funny looking square at the top of this handout is? It's a QR code, short for Quick Response. QR codes can be read quickly by cell phones. Simply download a QR code scanner app for your cell phone. QR codes are popping up everywhere! Look for them on billboards, in-store displays, business cards, print ads, contests, direct mail flyers, websites, and coupons.

RedLaser

Red Laser is a QR code and barcode reader app available for download on iPhone, Android, and Windows Phones. Quickly generate QR codes without creating an account.

Google url shortener

Have a really long web link? Use Google url shortener to shorter really long web links. Also use this tool to create QR codes. Login with your Google account. This tool allows you to track site hits on shortened urls. The tool does not allow you to create customize urls.

Firefox Add-on: Mobile Barcoder

<https://addons.mozilla.org/en-US/firefox/>

Install the Mobile Barcoder on the Firefox browser and quickly create a QR code for any web site that you visit. Search for the add-on by visiting <http://www.mozilla.org/> and searching for Mobile Barcoder.

Install the add-on: Click add to Firefox / View / Toolbars / Make sure the Navigation toolbar is turned on (with a check mark) / Choose Customize / Find the Barcode Icon / Drag the Icon to the Navigation bar at the bottom of browser.

The Mobile Barcoder icon will appear in the lower right hand corner of your browser. A QR code will automatically be generated for each web site you visit. Click on the QR code to open in a new tab where you can copy or save the QR code.

Screenr

Screenr is a free web-based screen recorder that records what's on your computer screen. Screenr works on PCs or Macs and there is nothing to download and install. Record screencasts on up to 5 minutes long. Play screencasts on PCs, Macs, smartphones (iPhones & Droid) and iPads.

Screen-Cast-O-Matic

Want to create screencasts longer than 5 minutes? Use Screen-Cast-O-Matic to record screencasts up to 15 minutes long. Screen-Cast-O-Matic provides one-click screen recording on PCs or Macs with no installation needed. Create a free Screen-Cast-O-Matic or YouTube account and store screencasts, then share the link or embed code.

Join.me

Join.me is a simple free screen sharing tool available for PC or Mac. There is also a free mobile viewer app available for iPhone or Android. Use a one-time code to share your screen with participants (up to 250 people). The free version of Join.me allows you to share files, talk via VoIP over the internet, or chat with participants. Two limitations of the free version of Join.me are: sessions cannot be recorded and you cannot swap presenters. Upgraded features are available with the Pro version priced at \$19/month or \$149/year.

Diigo is a free online tool that allows you to bookmark your favorite web site links and access them anywhere by logging in with an account. Diigo enables effective collaborative research. Easily share your findings, complete with your highlights and sticky notes, with friends and colleagues.

Unlike media files uploaded to other projects, files uploaded to Wikimedia Commons can be embedded on pages of all Wikimedia projects without the need to separately upload them there.
